Join us in this weekly invitation to walk in solidarity with refugees and displaced persons through moments of prayer, reflection, and advocacy. It's an opportunity to see Christ revealed through God's people and it's a journey worth taking.

# Reflection

Advent invites us to be alert and to recognise at every corner of the road so many siblings in need of a hope-filled future.

Am I open to the 'stranger'?

How can I transform my gaze to see the face of Jesus in my migrant and refugee siblings?

In Syrian culture, if someone visits you without prior notice, it is expected that you will stop what you are doing and make every effort to be as hospitable as possible. How can I show hospitality in my daily life?

#### **Action of HOPE**

We create hope when we are able to change the discourse of hate and rejection for one of encounter and welcome.

We encourage you to learn firsthand how migrants and refugees live in your city. If you can't, read these three stories of determination and courage and share them with friends and family or in your social networks. Become a voice for refugees.

#### Reflection

Increasing global challenges and instability are weakening efforts toward achieving peace. When hope is hard to find, divisions provoke social conflicts, frustrations, and violence.

Women, men, and children forced to flee their homes are among those paying the highest price. Some experience incredible hardship on their journey to safety and are often met with hostility in their host countries. Others are left at the margins, with their needs neglected and their voices unheard.

We invite you to be present in parts of the world in need of peace. And to look at this reality and let us be affected by it.

- 3. Stories of people fleeing Sudan in search of safety

#### **Action of PEACE**

Like Artisans use their skills, passion, and creativity to patiently craft unique items, we too can devote our time and care to create peaceful communities.

This week we invite you to pray for political leaders and decision-makers, that they may listen to the stories of displaced persons and that their policies may prioritise refugees. Let's <u>advocate</u> the cause of forcibly displaced people, by contacting your policymakers and asking for their support. Your voice is critical in helping refugees.

#### Reflection

## **Action of JOY**

On this 'Gaudete Sunday' we rejoice as witnesses to the joyful anticipation of the shepherds who journeyed to see Jesus in Bethlehem, even before the wise men.

We, like the shepherds and the Three Wise Men, are preparing the table, the food, and the presents to offer as a celebration of the birth of the child Jesus.

As we prepare ourselves for the festivities consider sharing that joy and present it to baby Jesus by organising a food drive, donating some of your clothes or donating to one of our projects.

# 4. LOVE: Angel's Candle - Advent activities for the week of December 24th

## Reflection

The God of history summons us to gather around a simple manger that brought hope in new life. In that poverty revealed in the manger, in the simplicity of the lives of simple and ordinary people, God's presence can bring us a great surprise.

Just as more than 2000 years ago, the Lord is incarnated today in our cities and in our mangers. The encounter with the vulnerable on the margins of our neighborhoods allows us to meet God.

What are those places in my city where I can visit my migrant and refugee siblings and share LIFE with them?

Lord, light my light today so that it may illuminate the lives of so many people forced to flee their homes who are now my neighbours.

# **Action of LOVE**

Let us not be afraid that the Lord is with us; we are full of grace.

We invite you to explore the option of gathering with others and explore ways to welcome Jesus in the manger by welcoming refugees.
