### **Chapter 1**

## FROM REFUGEE TO ACTIVIST: ANGIE'S MISSION TO EMPOWER WOMEN IN EXILE

LEADING THE FIGHT FOR WOMEN'S RIGHTS ACROSS BORDERS.

At 15, Angie was forced to leave her home in Colombia, fleeing the long-standing armed conflict. She found refuge in Ecuador, but one encounter changed her perspective forever. "I met a mother who had fled like me, with her children. She was struggling — no job, no support, living in terrible conditions. I realized I had to keep fighting, not just for myself, but for people like her."

Determined to advocate for displaced women, Angie channeled her pain into activism. After receiving training from NGOs, including JRS, she became a voice for migrant women's rights, leading seminars in schools and working to set up pathways of support for women survivors of gender-based violence. "As women and refugees, we face double discrimination. We need to know our rights, fight for them, and make sure they're respected."

Today, Angie works to raise awareness about women's rights, especially in refugee communities, and calls for equal opportunities. **She advocates for the end of gender stereotypes** and pushes for global recognition of refugee women's voices.

Olena's journey from Ukraine to Poland wasn't just a physical escape — it was a journey of rediscovering her purpose. Fleeing Kherson with her child during the violent onset of war, **she didn't know if she would survive**. "When we fled, we ran over a grenade. How it didn't explode, I still don't know," she recalls.

In Poland, Olena struggled to find work in her previous field as an education specialist. But with support from JRS Poland and the *One Proposal*, a project led by JRS Europe, **she learned Polish and found work in a café**. From that first job, she nurtured a lifelong dream of owning her own café.

Now, Olena is the proud owner of SofiLen Café, a cozy space in Nowy Sacz that welcomes students, tourists, and locals alike. Her café isn't just a business — it's a symbol of her perseverance, a place where she poured her heart and soul.

"I treat my café with my whole soul. I want everyone who enters to feel welcome, to feel at home."

When Wilikon fled the Central African Republic and arrived in Cameroon, he carried little more than his skills as a nail technician. His journey, marked by violence and loss, didn't dampen his entrepreneurial spirit. After starting out by walking the streets with a small basket of supplies, Wilikon attended business school, with the support of JRS.

With a small grant from JRS, he was able to open his own nail salon and officially register his business. "I went from carrying my basket around the streets to owning my shop," he proudly shares. His salon has since become a hub of beauty and confidence, with clients returning regularly, drawn not just by his skill, but by his warmth.

Balancing work with evening classes in Communications and Marketing, Wilikon dreams of expanding his business and mentoring others. He hopes to open another salon and train his siblings and other refugees. "I want to give back. I want to help others, just like JRS helped me."
